Pendleton Statistics

- Population of 16,719 (1,600 of those are incarcerated at the Eastern Oregon Correctional Institution)
- Median household income of \$54,834
- Persons in poverty 14.4%
- Umatilla County has a population of 77,319. 30,931 of those are enrolled or eligible for Medicaid.
- Farming, ranching community





Large Events

- Jackalope Jamboree
 - Three day concert, thousands attend
- CTUIR Pow Wow
 - o Tribes from US and Canada attend
- Pendleton Whisky Music Festival
 - Attendance is 12,000-21,000
- Pendleton Bike Week
- Pendleton Round Up
 - Attendance is roughly 50,000



Large (unscheduled) Events



- December 2012 a Korean tour bus went over the side of Deadman's Pass
 - 9 deceased, 18 were transported to SAH
- March 2018 a 20 car pileup happened near the same spot
 - 1 deceased, 11 were transported to SAH
- January 2022 a 98 car pile-up (with an additional 80+ stranded)
 - No deceased, SAH treated 13 patients



The Pendleton Round-Up

The Pendleton Round-Up

The first Round-Up rodeo took place in Pendleton on September 29th, 1910

- Second full week of September
- Features many different events:
 - Happy Canyon Western Show
 - XTreme bull riding
 - Concert
 - Parades





Round-Up Week

Week Long Celebration

- The Round-Up starts with the Dress-Up Parade
 - Motorized parade where people are are dressed up and ride floats and cars
- That evening is the Kick-off Concert
 - Takes place in the Happy Canyon Arena
 - Past acts include Brooks and Dunn, George Strait, Rascal Flatts







Xtreme Bulls

 Monday and Tuesday night the Happy Canyon Arena hosts the Xtreme Bulls Tour Finale

 This event has a \$110,000 payout for the contestants and is the final event of the ProRodeo season so it is highly competitive



Happy Canyon

- Joined the Pendleton Round-Up schedule in 1914
- Nightly live show that tells the story of Pendleton's founding.
- This story is told through the eyes of both the emigrants that settled here as well as the local American Indian tribes native to this area.
- Generations of members from the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation (CTUIR) and Pendleton have taken part in this show







Tipi Village

- The Tipi Village has been apart of the Round-Up since 1910
- This area is a hub of activity for the Native American community
- Over 300 tipis are set up each year
- Many tipis are set up by members of the CTUIR
 - Sites are generational and passed down within families



Rodeo

- The rodeo starts on Wednesday and ends with the championship on Saturday
- Featured events include:
 - o Bareback bronc, saddle bronc
 - Bull riding
 - Steer wrestling, steer roping
 - Barrel racing
 - Breakaway roping
 - Indian relay racing
 - Wild cow milking
 - Indian dancing





Rodeo

Things to note:

- The Round-Up is the only rodeo in the world that has a grass arena
 - This increases the difficulty for even the best cowboys/cowgirls
- Since 1960 the RU has included the Indian Relay Race. This race features 12 teams of four, where at the completion of each lap, the rider switches out and completes a lap on the bareback horse
 - Teams are made up from mostly regional tribes
 - Almost always adds to our trauma numbers





Westward Ho! Parade



- On Friday morning, the Westward Ho!
 Parade marches through Pendleton
- This parade is non-mechanized and carts can only be pulled by animals
- Marching bands, wagons, local tribe men and women, and rodeo Royalty are all present in their full regalia

Three Main Players

- Local EMS
- Round-Up Medical Team
- St. Anthony Hospital





Local EMS



- Pendleton Fire
 - 48 hour shifts
 - Two stations
 - One Captain
 - 2 Lieutenants
 - 4 FF/Paramedics
 - Additional sleepers
 - Reservists





- Medic 41 (CTUIR Tribal Fire)
 - The Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation (CTUIR) service area covers the Umatilla Reservation, parts of Umatilla County, and Cabbage Hill.





- Medic 61 (Athena/Weston)
 - East Umatilla Fire and Rescue. They are staffed 24/7/365. They cover northern parts of Umatilla County and transport patients to both us and St. Mary's in Walla Walla, Washington.
- Life Flight
 - Rotary wing based in Pendleton



- Pendleton Fire Department stages one ambulance at the Round-Up grounds each day that there are rodeo events
- They are also staged at the Happy Canyon Arena during the Xtreme Bulls Finals event
- Local nightly events keep EMS busy
 - Increased traumas, medical calls



- Weather also plays a large factor as many spectators are outside all day/sleep in campers
 - 2023 was much hotter than previous years leading to increased
 EMS calls for weather related illnesses
- Westward Ho! Parade presents additional EMS challenges
 - Large amount of animals makes the parade route inaccessible by ambulance/fire trucks
 - Ambulances are staged at the four corners with additional crews in the crowd

Round-Up Medical Team

- Kristin Schmidtgall, MPH, MPAS, PA-C is the Round-Up Medical Director
- She oversees the First Aid areas and volunteer medical staff
- She has years of experience assisting the former MD and she is also our local ortho PA and Assistant Medical Chief for PFD

RU Medical Team

- Sports Medicine team
 - C-arm for x-ray imaging
 - Reductions, splints, injury management for contestants
 - Contracted out
- Two First Aid stations in the Arena
 - For attendees, vendors, volunteers, etc.
 - Dehydration, heat, bees, and saltheavy foods are common ailment causes for spectators
 - There are over 40 healthcare volunteers that man the First Aid stations





RU Medical Team

- All volunteers
- Many are local EMS providers and hospital nursing staff
- Their presence is instrumental in maintaining as safe an atmosphere as possible
 - You'll find them on the field with the contestants



RU Medical Team


- 2023 stats (not including Sports Medicine):
 - Evaluated and treated 40 people onsite which greatly reduced EMS calls/ED traffic
 - 104 people received minor treatment (otc meds, bandaids, etc.)



St. Anthony Hospital

St. Anthony Hospital

- 25 bed critical access hospital that has served this community for more than 100 years
- Available services:
 - Surgical services (OB/GYN, General, Urological, Ortho, Dental, ...)
 - Cancer/Coumadin Clinic
 - Family Medicine Clinic
- Departments: ED, Med/Surg, CCU, and FBC





Surgical Services

- During Round-Up, we do have 24/7 general surgical service coverage
- Our orthopedic surgeon works down at the rodeo, keeping patients from the ED
- All elective general surgeries are canceled during this week
- This frees up a lot of nursing staff to volunteer down at the Round-Up grounds





Emergency Department



Emergency Dept.

- 10 treatment rooms. All with cardiac monitoring
- 1 trauma/resuscitation bay
- Hallway beds are added as needed



ED Staffing

- 1 provider on shift
 - o 12 hour shifts
- Minimum of two RNs on shift
 - Two additional during the m shift hours
- CNA
 - sometimes...





Round-Up ED Staffing

- An additional RN staffed 24/7 if possible
 - This is done on a voluntary basis
 - Difficult to Fill premium is added
 - The ED manager is often working the floor this week
- PTO Blackout
 - No PTO is approved during this week
 - Trades CAN happen between staff
 - You're more likely to get Christmas off



Round-Up ED Staffing

Per Diem Nurse. Defined as a nurse who works less than twenty-four (24) hours per week. A per diem nurse must be available to work at least six (6) shifts in a three (3) month period of time to retain status as a per diem nurse. In addition, a per diem nurse must be available to work one (1) of three summer holidays (Memorial Day, Independence Day, or Labor Day), or any day of Round Up Week, and one Winter major holiday (Christmas, New Year's Day, Thanksgiving).

The Round-Up is even accounted for in the ONA Bargaining Agreement!



- 2021:
 - Round-Up week: 285 patients (daily average census 35 pts)
 - 6 traumas from the Rodeo/spectators
 - 1 admitted
 - 3 transfered
 - Bucked off horse
 - Car vs. Pedestrian (ETOH)
 - MVC (pt was a contestant, death in the vehicle)



Attendance was down this year after being canceled in 2020

- 2022:
 - Round-Up week: 358 patients (daily average census 44 pts)
 - Four of those days were 52+
 - 5 traumas from the Rodeo/spectators
 - 1 transfered
 - Assaulted
 - 3 fell from horses
 - 1 was a geriatric GLF while anticoagulated



- 2023:
 - Round-Up week: 333 patients (daily average census 41 pts)
 - One daily was census was 63
 - During this week we ranged from 3-4 mental health holds daily
 - 6 traumas from the Rodeo/spectators



- 2023:
 - 1 admitted (stab wound)
 - 2 transferred
 - 3 discharged
 - 2 were contestants, I was in the parade and fell off his wagon (anticoagulated)



Aftermath



AAR

- Each year after the Round-Up all involved (EMS, PRU Medical Staff, St. A's, Police, Fire, etc.) all complete an AAR
- We take our lessons learned and build them into the plan for the following year
