The ACCESS Project supports local teams of medical and educational experts to provide early autism identification & treatment for families in their home communities across Oregon. Ideally, teams also include a Parent Partner who supports families during the assessment process, linking them with key community resources.

- Access to Parent Partners who can connect families to local resources
- Coordination of care and services between school and community providers
- Less cost and stress associated with evaluation
