ELECTIVE ROTATIONS - 10 CREDITS

Working under the supervision of licensed clinical preceptors, the student will earn and develop the discipline-specific principles and practices inherent to the specialty. The goal of the course is for the student to develop proficiency in obtaining the medical history, performing physical exams, developing a differential diagnosis, designing diagnostic and therapeutic treatment plans, performing clinical procedures, and providing patient education. These skills are dependent on developing increased familiarity with scientific evidence and accurate clinical judgment. Additionally, students will continue to develop effective interprofessional communication skills and professional behaviors and attributes.
