Jan. 4 | World Braille Day

Braille is a code that enables us to read with our fingertips using a system of six raised dots. It was created in 1824 by Louis Braille who was born on January 4, 1809. Today, Braille is used all over the world in many languages. Braille signs make it easier for blind people to get around university campuses, read novels, solve math and learn and compose music.

In 2023, more than eight in ten (80.9%) uninsured were families with incomes below 400% of the federal poverty level. The White population made up 37.1% of the uninsured, and the remaining 62.9% included Hispanic/Latino (41.1%), Black/African American (12.5%) and Asian (3.7%). Almost three-quarters (73.9%) of uninsured people lived in the West or South.
